The Trinity: Journey of Discovery
Exhibit Debuts at Latino Cultural Center
January 16 – February 7, 2015

Dallas, TX – The Trinity River Corridor Project and the Latino Cultural Center are excited to present the winning images from the 2014 Trinity River Photo Contest to be on display at the Latino Cultural Center at 2600 Live Oak Street, from January 16, 2015 through February 7, 2015. The exhibit will showcase 71 photographs taken within the Trinity River Corridor.

The exhibit, ***The Trinity: Journey of Discovery***, will provide a remarkable glimpse into an area of Dallas that offers beautiful recreation areas for walking, running, hiking, biking, bird watching, and sight-seeing. The professional, amateur and youth photographer's, captured amazing images in four categories: Architecture/Structures, Forest/Prairie, River/Ponds, and Wildlife.

This year's collection of photographs showcases images of wildlife up close or in their world of water, prairie or forest within the Trinity River corridor. The Grand Prize winner captures the grace and gentle spirit of water birds feeding in a Trinity pond. The judging panel was led by Michael Hamtil, photo editor for the Dallas Morning News.

The Trinity River Photo Contest is currently in its sixth year, and it is produced by the City of Dallas. The contest inspires people of all ages to visit the Trinity River corridor and enjoy local outdoor adventure.

About the Trinity River Corridor Project: The Trinity River Corridor Project is the largest and most complex public works and urban development project undertaken by the City of Dallas. This project is a flood protection solution at its heart and one of the largest of its type in the nation. It consists of five major components: flood protection, transportation, recreation, environmental stewardship, and business development. Projects under construction are Trinity Strand Phase I, Pavaho Wetlands, Baker Pump Station, Riverfront Boulevard Improvements, Dallas Horse Shoe Project IH35, IH30 and Margaret McDermott Bridge at IH30. Recently opened, the Trinity Skyline Trail provides 4.6 miles of hard surface trail in the Dallas Floodway and Continental Bridge West Dallas Gateway offers visitor's passive and active programming for people of all ages.
